War Graves from both conflicts in Willow Grove Cemetery

There are graves from both World Wars in this cemetery. A War Cross is erected and there is also a Screen Wall bearing the names of those whose graves that are not marked by headstones.

All burials in Brunswick Methodist Church Burial Ground are now named on the Screen Wall. The number of identified casualties is 145. The Screen Wall, the Cross of Sacrifice and many graves of casualties of the World Wars across the cemetery are still maintained regularly by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Soldat Jean Francois Vermeulen Died 28th October 1914 Age 23

Private Soldat Jean Francois Vermeulen 59694 served with infantry 1 Linie Regiment 2nd Battalion 1st Company of the Belgian Army. Died in Stockport Infirmary of tetanus from wounds received on 21st October 1914 at Kaaskerke. near Diksmuide during the battle of Yzer.



2 Rifleman John Horrocks, D.C.M. 7th Bn., King's Royal Rifle Corps. Died 2nd March 1916. Age 20

Died of wounds received at Ypres Dec 1915. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for gallantry.



Seaman Laurence Hoyle Leading Air Fitter Died 27th March 1943 Age 20

On 27 March 1943, HMS Dasher was in the Firth of Clyde when one of her Swordfish planes was practicing take-offs and landings. Suddenly a violent internal explosion occurred sending Dasher to the bottom in only 5 minutes. 379 men drowned and 149 men were picked up by rescue vessels.



Private Harry Greaves Non Combatant Corps Died 11th January 1942 Age 26

Over 400 NCC soldiers died defusing bombs. Generally joined on religious grounds, not to fight. They became stretcher carriers, bomb disposal or ambulance drivers.

Sgt. William Tait Croall

Wire Operator/Air Gunner Roval Air Force Voluntary Reserve Died 19 August 1942. Age 25



Sqt. William Beeley

Wire Operator/Air Gunner Royal Air Force Voluntary Res. Died 19 August 1942. Age 21

Both of the above airmen were killed in an air crash in Northumberland during a navigational exercise. It was possible their Whitley Mk V had been mistaken for a German bomber.



Second Lieutenant Tom Casson, M.C. **Cheshire Regiment** Died 17th May 1917. Age 21

He saw action at Gallipoli and was wounded in the shoulder on 9 June 1915. He recovered but was then killed in a training accident when a faulty grenade prematurely exploded. He was buried with full military honours.



Sgt. Joseph Lister, V.C. Sgt. 1st Bn. Lancashire Fusiliers

At the 3rd Battle of Ypres Belgium, October 9 1917 Sgt. Lister dashed ahead of his men and found a machine gun firing from a shell hole in front of a pill-box. He shot two of the enemy gunners, and the remainder surrendered to him. He then went on to the pill-box and shouted to the occupants to surrender. They did so with the exception of one man, whom Sgt. Lister shot dead; whereupon about 100 of the enemy emerged from shell holes further to the rear and surrendered. For this action he was awarded the Victoria Cross.
